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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The principal activity of the company during the year was to promote the benefit and the spiritual and moral welfare of young people in Ayr.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

The Ark has continued throughout 2016 to engage successfully with young people through Friday evening diversionary events, equipping them with life skills through our work with schools and other partners, and empowering them with the experience and confidence to reach for a more positive future for themselves.

Over the course of the year over 3,835 young people were recorded as coming to The Ark, not only in attending our diversionary evening events (an average of 41 attending each weekend for about 46 weeks of the year), but also for the midweek lunch cafes on Wednesdays and Thursdays during school term times (an average of 40 each week during school terms).

Our staff's work with local schools with young people who are at risk of falling into the category of being NEET (i.e. "Not in Education, Employment or Training") through disengaging from school with few if any qualifications, has also developed and become more extensive over the course of the year. In this area of work The Ark's staff are able to provide extra support where it is needed most through working with Prince's Trust xI groups and helping to deliver. More Choices More Chances programmes - a facet of the Scotlish Government's "Opportunities For All" strategy in which "every 16 to 19-year-old in Scotland has a guaranteed offer of a place in education or training". Working with each of the four Academies (secondary schools) in Ayr with the pupils they have chosen as being most in danger of falling into the NEET category, we deliver project / community-based classes (either with pupils coming into The Ark or our staff going out to the schools). These are designed to help build-up the pupils' confidence and transferable skills. Furthermore, by participating in these classes, the pupils may also achieve an SQA award in personal development, a Saltire award for volunteering, and/or different levels of Youth Achievement awards.

A recent development of our work with young people is through mentoring a small number of young people, who have been identified by their school as being those who should benefit from sessions on a one-to-one basis with someone who is able to give them the time and space to help them overcome issues and problems in their lives.

In recognition of the prevalence of the nature and threats associated with child exploitation on-line, The Ark has ensured that some of its staff are trained and recognised as CEOP Ambassadors. This enables them to deliver to young people in schools and others (including teachers, parents/guardians, etc.) accurate up to date information on important issues such as using the net safety, online privacy, safe social networking, cyberbullying and grooming.

The Ark's ability to deliver this programme depends on the dynamic, and multi-talented nature of the three to four young people who make up The Ark's staff team. Their personalities and interpersonal skills, complemented by the cohesive and supportive network of a small number of committed, like-minded volunteers (ranging in age from 16 to over 60), have enabled the building of strong and positive relationships with many of the young people with whom this corporate 'team' of staff and volunteers comes into contact each week.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The financial statements are set out on pages 5 to 15.

The Statement of Financial Activities for the year shows total income of £101,391 and total expenditure of £107,228 which results in a net deficit of £5,837. Of this net deficit, expenses of £2,464 were attributable to unrestricted funds and £3,373 was attributable to restricted funds. General reserves now stand at £48,165. An overview of the purpose of the Restricted Funds is detailed in note 16 to the financial statements.

Changes in fixed assets are detailed in note 9 to the financial statements.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The Trustees have resolved that, in the interests of The Ark's sustainability, a moderate funds reserve of up to £25,000 be established should the same be required for an unforeseen contingency in the event of the project coming to an end.

FUTURE PLANS

Initially responding primarily to the problem of under-age drinking in Ayrshire, other threats and dangers have arisen for young people over the course of the last twelve years to match or even exceed under-age drinking (such as drugs, legal highs, bullying - both face-to-face and in the cyber world - sexting, child exploitation and grooming, etc.) So, taken together they justify and emphasise the continuing need for The Ark not only in being a location staging safe, diversionary events to steer young people away from those temptations, but also in helping to inform, counsel and mentor young people, in groups or as individuals, towards making positive, healthy life-style choices.

Fundamentally, the future of The Ark always has lain and always will lie in the hands of the young people we aim to work with and serve. For this reason, it is important that we continue to engage with young people 'where they are at', responding to changes in their attitudes, activities and circumstances, and empowering and equipping them to make the most of their lives both in the present and for the future. So, as long as we continue to diversify our work and provide support and services in line with needs and team capacity, the future for the project remains necessary, positive and bright.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The company is limited by guarantee and therefore has no share capital.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees may be drawn from the membership of the company by election at an Annual General Meeting or by appointment by the trustees either to fill a vacancy or as an additional trustee. The trustees may also appoint any non-member as a director.

Organisational structure

The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association with new directors being put forward by the members of the company for election. The trustees meet frequently to hear of progress on activities and take decisions as necessary and appropriate.

Induction and training of new trustees

New directors undergo an appropriate induction programme to brief them on their obligations under charity and company law and the financial performance of the company.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. The Trustees have reviewed the transactions and have determined that no amendment to the comparative figures is required.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Long leasehold

- 10% on cost

Improvements to property

25% on reducing balance25% on reducing balance

Plant and machinery Fixtures and fittings

- 25% on reducing balance

Assets costing more than £500 are capitalised.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolcte and slow moving items.

Taxation

The company is a registered charity and is accordingly exempt from taxation on income which is applied for charitable purposes. The company is not registered for Value Added Tax and, accordingly, any such irrecoverable tax is included in the expenditure concerned.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

South Ayrshire Council have also agreed that the remaining balance of funds from the football project can be used to contribute to the costs associated with delivering services to young people.

16. PURPOSE OF RESTRICTED FUNDS

Cultural Arts Project - This is a project involving the education of young people in creative art skills.

Bridge Project - The purpose of this project is to engage positively with young people excluded from The Ark due to the consumption of alcohol.

Rainbow Project - The original purpose of this fund was to provide support for investment in equipment needed to cost effectively provide The Ark with hot water through environmentally friendly means. However, two years ago the purpose of this fund was redefined with the permission of the original donor. The purpose of this fund is now to purchase replacement digital projectors for the Ark.

Staffing - Outreach Worker - This fund is from the Co-Operative Group's Community Fund to part fund the employment of an outreach worker.

Ark Capture Project - The purpose of this fund is to nurture creativity, promote leadership skills, encourage success and beneficially transform the lives of young people through the means of active participation in photographic and computer activities.

SAC Football Project - The aims of this project are to show (mainly disadvantaged) young people from three different youth projects - in Ayr, Dalmellington/Patna, and New Cumnock - how to work and play together in a friendly, fair and respectful way, lowering the levels of violence and rivalry between communities even in a competitive situation (i.e. playing football).

SAC - CPP Community Development Fund - The purpose of this fund is to train up new staff in order to continue our commitment to effectively serving the young people of South Ayrshire.

Community Education - The purpose of this fund, provided by The Moffat Charitable Trust, is to support our staff costs in relation to our work in Schools.

SAC Computer Grant - South Ayrshire Council provided funding to enable the purchase of new Desktop and Laptop computers.

Mentoring - The purpose of this fund, provided by Lloyds TSB Foundation is to support the delivery of a mentoring programme for six young people aged 11 - 18 years.

17. FIRST YEAR ADOPTION

This is the first year that the company has presented its financial statements under Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) issued by the Financial Reporting Council. The last financial statements under previous UK GAAP were for the year ended 31 December 2015 and the date of transition to FRS 102 was therefore 1 January 2015.
